The PMBOK® Guide takes the view that stakeholder influence occurs up front and then declines throughout the rest of the project (PMI, 2004, p. 21). In agile projects, however, the stakeholders' influence remains strong and does not decrease until the product is released and the project is over.

Agile project management and the PMBOK® guide

Although Agile software development techniques are considered to have 'potential' and Agile philosophies are not fundamentally at odds with the key knowledge areas of A Guide to the Project Management Body of Knowledge (PMBOK® Guide), Agile is typically overlooked in favor of the more established PMBOK® Guide techniques.

Agile and the PMBOK

The whole concept of PMBOK does not seem to be very consistent with an Agile approach: Agile is based on some very simple and succinct principles and values. It relies very heavily on the training and skill of the people performing the process to interpret those principles and values in the context of a project.

Agile is a more distinct program from PMBOK and PRINCE2. The Agile methodology is more flexible, making it better able to produce deliverables without the need for substantial changes and reworking. Tasks can be broken down into smaller stages and this allows for substantial risk reduction through earlier assessment, testing and analysis.

Firstly, the PMBOK is not a methodology, it is a standard, and also a set of guidelines, good practices for project management, while agile (let's agree here, that by 'agile' we mean something more concrete than the Agile Manifesto, e.g. Scrum) is much closer to a methodology (although here also ongoing debate, if you can talk about project management, or rather just about the production of the product / software).
