The sounds of the plural – S can be pronounced in three ways: [S], [Z] or [IZ]. The pronunciation depends on the last sound of the verb or noun which is usually a consonant. Before we learn the different ways to pronounce the final -S, we must first know what voiced and voiceless consonants are. Voiced Consonants vs. Voiceless Consonants

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Sounds of the Plural S in English - Learn ESL

The pronunciation of the S at the end of words in English. The pronunciation of the final S in plural words and verbs in the third person depend on the final consonant sound before that S. The ending is pronounced /s/ after a voiceless sound, it is pronounced /z/ after a voiced sound and is pronounced / z / or / z/ after a sibilant sound: Voiceless: helps /ps/ -- sits /ts/ -- looks /ks/.

It ends with the mm M consonant sound. It ' s voiced, it ' s not a special case, therefore, the S is pronounced as a [z]. Times, times, zz, zz. Box. The final sound in this word is the ‘ s ’ sound. ‘ S ’ falls in the third category. Therefore, we make it plural by adding an ‘ e ’ and an ‘ s ’ .

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How to Pronounce Plural Nouns - Rachel's English

Here is the rule to help you: When the letter ‘ s ’ is after an unvoiced or quiet consonant, it is pronounced as a /s/. e.g., hats, tops, works, laughs, what ' s, moths. When the letter ‘ s ’ is after a vowel, another ‘ s ’ , or a voiced consonant, it is pronounced as a /z/ sound.
