Weiss and Lokken⁶⁰ also used the middle range transitions theory as the theoretical basis to single out predictors and outcomes of postpartum women's readiness for hospital discharge and concluded that the nature of the transition and the transition conditions were associated with the patterns of response in the post-discharge period.
